2012 Annual Report of the Director of Lay Activities

We began a NEW THING for the Eleventh Episcopal District with the Geographic meetings. It was an unusual and different adventure, but we DID it in four of the six conferences...Between the two meetings held in Tallahassee with the Florida and East Conferences and in Kissimmee held with the West Coast and Central Conferences we had over 200 people registered and attending. That is what is working well! What Needs To Be Refined? A Renewed Look At Our History.

Our Children do not value our church because they do not know the story. We cannot tell them the story because we don't know the story. We do not understand why we believe what we say we believe..We need to embrace the history of our church and review and renew it regularly. As the year began, I met with the Conference Directors of Lay Activities and each was given the task of presenting in some way throughout the year the 25 Articles of Religion to their conference. I tell you so that you will hold them accountable. The idea would be that they Conference Directors would share with the PE district directors and the PE district directors would share with the local directors so that by the end of the year at least all of us would have reviewed the 25 articles. Some of them completed the task; others did not. It is still the task we are working on. It is surprising how many of us have been in this

church for over 30 years and have not a clue what our basic beliefs are. A review of the 25 articles would help us to refocus.

Many years ago there was a TV show called the 6 Million Dollar Man where Steve Austin was made over to run faster, see clearer and farther, and possessed great strength. A favorite phrase from the show's introduction was "WE HAVE THE TECHNOLOGY." How appropriate that phrase is for our Lay Organization... We have the means to meet our challenges head on and make the Lay Organization a welcoming, vital part of the church. What is working Well... We are as a Lay Family... The successes have come when we have united and pooled our resources on one accord. The challenge is getting the message out and telling our own story through teaching about our history and our legislation and policy and procedures, and remaining loving, and likable during the entire process.

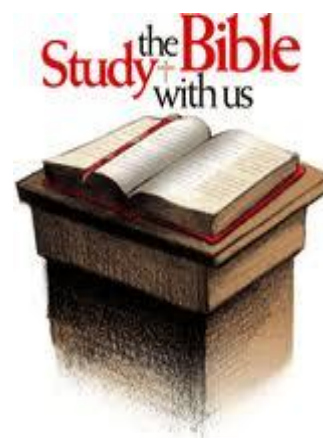
Lay Benevolent Activities Program

Devotion

The Bible study began with an inspiring devotion led by Sis. Katherine Gillis, the Episcopal Chaplain. The opening song was “I promised the Lord that I will hold out” followed by prayer and ended by singing I’m still here.” Sis. Evelyn Graham (member of Bethel A.M.E. Church in St. Petersburg, FL, West Coast Conference) presented the Bible study lesson.

The lesson was taken from Mark 4:1-9 using the topic: “The Parable of the Sower” also known as the “The sermon by the sea side.” Sis. Graham first explained the

differences between a fable, a fairytale and a parable. A parable being an “earthly story using a heavenly meaning.” Using pictures her grandchildren drew, she was able to give us a vivid picture of the parable Jesus was teaching the people about the sower planting seeds. The sower being Jesus, the soil being the heart, and the seed being the message/word of God.

All of us can be “sowers” but “God” produces the increase. Our job is to plant the seed whenever and wherever we can. Some hearts will be receptive to the word but some will not. The good soil (a

receptive heart) will not only be an open heart but will also hear the word and obey the word.

The Bible study ended with a prayer that we should be like the good soil and bring forth a beautiful harvest.
