REFLECTIONS FROM THE EKKLESIA YOUNG ADULT LEADRSHIP SUMMIT SIS. TERI PARRISH-WILLIAMS, SOUTH CONFERENCE YPD DIRECTOR



In June, I had the privilege of attending the Ekklesia Lay Young Adults Leadership Summit, a transformative gathering that stirred hearts, shifted minds, and deepened our collective call to Kingdom service. In my opinion this wasn't just another event on the calendar, but it was an encounter that embodied the very essence of its theme: Inspiring the Extraordinary.

From the moment I entered the grounds of the hotel, it was clear that the Young Adult Representative, Dante Buckson and his committee, had planned under the weight of divine instruction. 

BREAST CANCER IN BLACK MEN AND WOMEN AGES 18-35

BREAST CANCER IS OFTEN SEEN AS A DISEASE AFFECTING OLDER WOMEN, BUT IT ALSO IMPACTS YOUNG ADULTS – INCLUDING THOSE IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY. WHILE RARE AT THIS AGE, DIAGNOSES BETWEEN 18–35 CAN BE MORE AGGRESSIVE AND PRESENT UNIQUE CHALLENGES.

KEY FACTS

- Black women under 35 are twice as likely to be diagnosed with aggressive breast cancers compared
- to white women.
- Black women have a 40% higher death rate from breast cancer overall.
- Young Black women are more likely to be diagnosed at later stages.
- Black men account for 1 in 100 breast cancer cases, but are more likely to die from the disease than
- white men.
- Common aggressive subtype: Triple-Negative Breast Cancer (TNBC) is more prevalent in Black patients.

WHY YOUNG BLACK ADULTS ARE AT RISK

- Genetics and family history (BRCA1/BRCA2 gene mutations)
- Limited access to early screening
- Misdiagnosis or delayed diagnosis due to age bias
- Health disparities and systemic inequities
- Environmental stress and lifestyle factors

WARNING SIGNS (DON'T IGNORE)

- A new lump or thickening in breast or chest area
- Nipple discharge (especially bloody)
- Changes in breast shape, size, or skin texture
- Pain in breast or underarm
- Swelling or skin dimpling ("orange peel" skin)
- *Men can have symptoms too. Any new chest lump should be checked.*

Breast cancer doesn't have to be a silent killer in our community. Awareness, early action, and advocacy save lives.
